


Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and Trauma-Informed Care (TIC) Information Sheet

ACEs: The percentages to the left indicate the % of children aged o to 17 years who experienced two or more of the following: Socioeconomic hardship, parental divorce/separation, death of a parent, parent served time in jail, witness to domestic violence, victim or witness of neighborhood violence, lived with someone who was mentally ill or suicidal or someone with an alcohol or drug problem, or treated or judged unfairly due to race/ethnicity.

Wisconsin's ACEs Ranking: 16th out of 50

Trauma-Informed Care: Becoming trauma-informed is a process using knowledge about the prevalence and impact of toxic stress (e.g., ACEs) to reexamine how we see, interpret, and interact with people. TIC is a culture change process being trauma-informed requires viewing the world through a new lens. It is not a therapy, intervention, or specific action; it is an all encompassing paradigm shift. Wisconsin's ACEs and TIC Activities

Legislation: Wisconsin Senate Joint Resolution 59 states that policy decisions enacted by the Wisconsin state legislature will take into account early childhood brain development, ACEs, and resilience.

Fostering Futures (FF)

2011: Co-founded FF as a public/private collaborative including The Office of the First Lady of Wisconsin in partnership with Casey Family Programs

2012: Held seven First-Lady TIC listening sessions statewide; Applied for <u>Healthier Wisconsin Partnership Program</u> (HWPP) grant

2013: Awarded HWPP grant; Presented ACEs to Governor's Cabinet and legislative leadership; Formed Policy Advisory Council; Participated in NGA 3-branch Institute on child well-being; Conducted first shared learning session for growing statewide coalition

2014: Conducted three shared learning sessions

2015: Hosted statewide FF Summit on ACEs and TIC for 700 participants; Contracted with National Council for Behavioral Health to facilitate phase two of FF TIC learning communities

2016: Wisconsin legislature launched a bi-partisan bicameral <u>Children's Caucus</u>; Milwaukee County launched WI's first Healthy <u>Infants Court</u>; Legislature authorized funding for <u>Connections Count</u>; Hired FF Director and Public Health Coordinator; Hosted county and state FF teams

2017: First Lady Tonette Walker speaks at State of the State Address; Met with federal Cabinet Secretaries (DOL, DOE, HUD, DHHS); Drafted House Resolution 443 to recognize the importance and effectiveness of TIC and engaged Congressman Mike Gallagher (R-WI) and Congressman Danny Davis (D-IL) as co-sponsors



- WI Dept. of Children and Families, WI Dept. of Workforce
 Development, WI Economic Development Corporation, WI Dept. of
 Veterans Affairs, and WI Dept. of Corrections each have FF teams
 who are providing staff TIC trainings and leading departmental TIC
 transformation efforts
- WI Dept. of Health Services FF team amended the state's health plan to include focus on ACEs
- WI Dept. of Public Instruction sponsors training and consultation to schools across the state and has created a <u>website</u> rich with resources

Other Activities

- Wisconsin Children's Mental Health Collective Impact is one of 14 participating in the Mobilizing Action for Resilient Communities (MARC) grant with a focus on family and youth involvement in policy making and engaging business in the ACEs/TIC movement
- The Collective Impact's TIC Workgroup created a Wisconsin TIC Map which tracks WI TIC activities
