

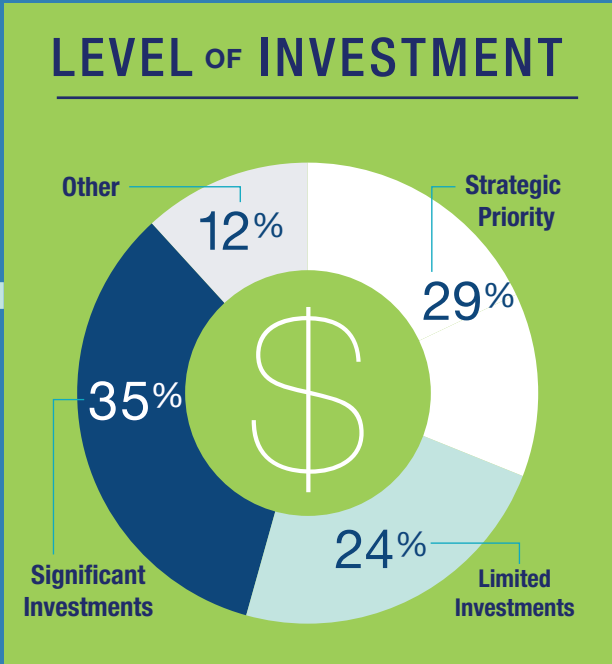

# PRIMARY FOCUS AREAS

**MORE THAN**

**60%**

**OF RESPONDENTS FOCUS ON:**

- Health and social service provider training and capacity building
- Early childhood prevention and treatment
- Child and adolescent-serving systems (e.g. child welfare, health, mental health, education, and juvenile justice)
- School-based interventions

**ROUGHLY**

**35%**

**OF RESPONDENTS FOCUS ON:**

- Individuals impacted by household mental illness or substance use disorders
- Historical trauma and intergenerational healing approaches
- Individuals impacted by economic instability or homelessness
- Immigrants, refugees, and asylum seekers
- Individuals impacted by physical, emotional, sexual abuse
- Secondary traumatic stress (e.g. provider emotional burnout or compassion fatigue)
- Individuals impacted by domestic violence
- Community violence and neighborhood safety

**LESS THAN**

**20%**

**OF RESPONDENTS FOCUS ON:**

- Criminal justice and law enforcement training and capacity building
- Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer or questioning communities
- Individuals impacted by neglect
- Individuals impacted by justice-involved household members
- Military and veteran families
- Disaster response and recovery (e.g. natural disasters, pandemics, and terrorism)
- Other
