

# GOVERNMENT GRANTS FOR THE TRAUMA-INFORMED MOVEMENT

Analysis of Federal Grants Posted and Forecasted from October 1-31st, 2022

CTIPP knows funding is important to trauma-informed work. As we continue advocating for new and additional funding, we analyzed federal grants already available for states, localities, and community-based organizations in our network.

By searching Grants.gov for keywords [trauma](#), [Adverse Childhood Experiences \(ACEs\)](#), [healing](#), and [prevention](#) throughout October, we discovered 24 grants aligned with the work happening throughout our network.

**WHAT IS A FEDERAL GRANT?** The federal government funds project to provide public services through grants. Federal agencies list the gifts through “funding opportunities,” review applications, award funding, and evaluate performance. Federal grants can be attained through state and local governments or certain nonprofit organizations. Some grants awarded to state and local governments can be dispersed to local 501(c)(3)s.

Many of the grants (11) start at \$100,000, which means that smaller community-based organizations are well-positioned to apply.

These trauma-related grants are available across many topics, with the majority focused on violence prevention and child welfare.

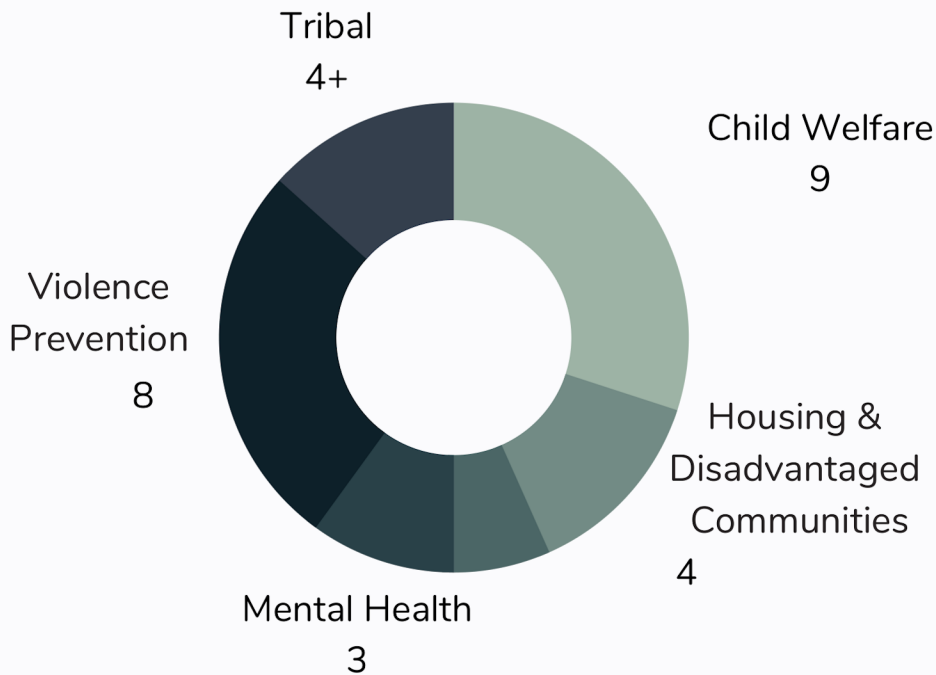
Most appointments are available to 501(c)(3)s, states, and localities. Local and state advocates working to advance trauma initiatives can encourage their governments to apply.

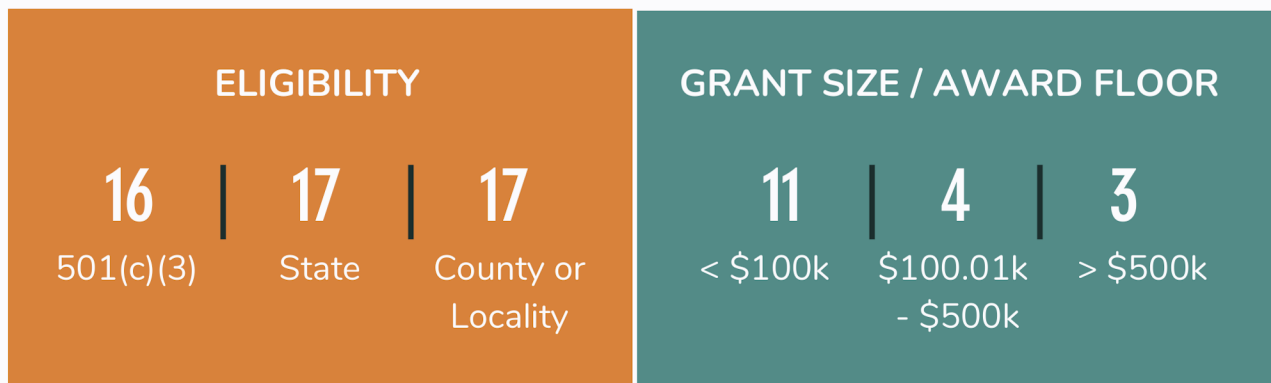
