Mr. Gilgoff is the founder and former Executive Director of the awardwinning Oakland-based nonprofit Brotherson the Rise (BOTR), which continues to empower boys and young men of color, adult allies and the institutions that serve them. At BOTR, Jon and other staff developed Trail Brothers, an environmental education and outdoor exploration program for male youth and their families.

Rachel Gilgoff, MD, FAAP

Pediatrician, UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital Oakland Clinical Innovations Lead, Center for Youth Wellness

Dr. Gilgoff is a board-certified child abuse pediatrician, former Academy of Violence and Abuse Scholar, and helped develop BCHO's "Resiliency Clinic." She is a core Center for Nature and Health team member who helped develop this training.

Jen Matthews, MD

Pediatrician, UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital Oakland Faculty Scholar, UCSF Osher Center for Integrative Medicine

Dr. Matthews currently co-directs the SHINE park prescription program as well as an integrative medicine clinic for Children's Hospital Primary Care patients.

Daphne Miller, MD

Associate Clinical Professor, UC San Francisco Research Scientist, UC Berkeley, School of Public Health

Dr. Miller work has focused on aligning agriculture and conservation with human health. In 2009 she worked with the Institute of the Golden Gate to develop the "Park Prescription" program and she is currently working with the Globetrotter Foundation to develop the Health from the Soil Up Initiative, a multi-sector effort to build a "health sensitive" food system from the soil up. Miller was a science contributor to the Washington Post and continues to write for scientific peer-reviewed publications and the popular press.

Nooshin Razani, MD, MPH

Pediatrician, UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital Oakland Assistant Clinical Scientist, Children's Hospital Oakland Research Institute

Dr. Razani founded and runs a collaborative park prescription programs with East Bay Regional Parks District, conducted the first randomized trial of park prescriptions, and is excited to continue advancing the science of nature and health through her role as Director of the Center for Nature and Health.

Kemba Shakur

Founder and Director, Urban Releaf

Fondly referred to as the "Tree Lady", Ms. Shakur is the Founder and Director of Urban Releaf, an urban forestry nonprofit responsible for the planting and caring of an estimated 23,000 trees in low-income East Bay communities. She founded Urban Releaf 20 years ago, guiding it to success by abiding by two key principles – creating a more beautiful community where residents take pride in where they live and offering opportunities for at-risk youth and unemployed adults to gain marketable skills. She is working on a children's book titled, "A Tree Grows in Oakland."

Aiko Yoshino, PhD

Assistant Professor, Department of Recreation, Parks & Tourism, San Francisco State University

Dr. Yoshino's research includes the psychological resilience gained through extended wilderness-based programs as well as nature-based interventions for marginalized communities to prevent chronic illnesses. She works closely with community-based organizations for research, teaching, and innovative program development. Her teaching experience includes a range of levels, elementary to college, and places, educational outdoor expeditions from Alaska, Taiwan, to the Himalayas.
