American Rescue Plan – How much for California?

\$26 billion for CA, & \$16 billion to counties/cities

- \$2.2 B emergency rental assistance to families
- \$1 B homelessness assistance including emergency housing vouchers.
- \$3.9 B Childcare and Head Start providers
- \$15.1 B schools (for in-person learning, learning loss, etc)
- \$15 B Child Tax Credit, Earned Income Tax Credit, Children & Dependent Care Credit
- Unknown additional nutrition assistance
- · \$3 B premium support for Affordable Care Act

State Legislation


- AB 58 (Salas) Pupil health: suicide prevention policies and training: school-based health programs: pilot program.
- AB 118 (Kamlager) Emergency services: community response: grant program.
- AB 586 (O'Donnell & Wood) Pupil health: health and mental health services: School Health Demonstration Project.
- AB 573 (Carrillo) Youth Mental Health Boards.
- AB 1117 (Wicks) Pupil support services: Healthy Start: Toxic Stress and Trauma Resiliency for Children Program.

State Legislation

- · SB 224 (Portantino) Pupil instruction: mental health education.
- · SB 293 (Limón) Medi-Cal specialty mental health services.
- SB 428 (Hurtado) Health care coverage: adverse childhood experiences screenings.
- · SB 525 (Grove) School closures: mental health effects.
- SB 682 (Rubio) Childhood chronic health conditions: racial disparities.

State Budget Asks

- Child care: Invest at least \$5 billion (\$1.25 billion in new state funding on top of \$3.75 billion in federal funding) to stabilize, strengthen and scale child care, including: \$2 billion to expand child care subsidies for families with low incomes, with at least \$1 billion dedicated to infants & toddlers.
- TK-14 Education: Ensure there are effective student supports in place and school budgets are stabilized by using one-time federal funds provided for state-level education activities (\$1.4 billion)
- School based mental health: Provide \$80.5 million to fund turn-key school-county partnerships ready for implementation to provide student mental health services.




State Budget Asks

- **Medi-Cal:** Permanently extend Medi-Cal coverage for children up to age 5 and for women 12-months postpartum with \$55 million (matched with \$55 million in federal funds).
- Children in foster care: Support children & youth in foster care living with emergency caregivers or resource families with \$73.2 million in desperately needed pandemic stipends to address significant additional responsibilities and activities and \$37 million to increase access to the Emergency Child Care Bridge program to prevent placement instability resulting from reduced child care options.
