

- Child vaccinations down 40% from the same time last year. Immunization levels in January/February were similar to last year, but fell sharply in March/April – difference of 40% for 0-2 year olds, decrease of 40% in March, and 50-55% in April for 0-18 year olds.
- Too many students not connected to school. In an <u>Education</u>
   <u>Trust-West survey</u> of CA public school parents, only 45% said
   they were in regular contact with or had access to their child's
   teacher.



#### Impact on kids

Latinx children disproportionately represented among
 COVID cases. 74% of cases of virus for children 0-17 in California are Latino (but Latino kids are only 48% of population).

- Some child care providers are <u>shutting their doors</u> for good.
- <u>Reports</u> of child abuse/neglect down, due to <u>less contact with</u> mandatory reporters.



### State budget

- Deadline for state budget looming (June 15, but really June 12)
- Enormous budget deficit (Legislative Analyst's Office [LAO] says \$18-31B; Administration says \$54B)
- Proposed May Revise includes some increased revenue, some cuts, some withdrawn proposals, and ~\$15B in "trigger" cuts that would be rescinded if at least \$14B in federal funds are received.
- Legislature passed a <u>budget on June 4</u> with some differences.



### State budget

Key budget items related to children's wellbeing:

- Child welfare Family Urgent Response System (foster youth crisis hotline) and other cuts; child welfare disaster fund.
- K-12 Education \$19B less in May Revise than in January budget proposal; schools would receive \$6B in federal funding specifically for COVID-related learning loss and other costs.



### State budget

### Key budget items related to children's wellbeing:

- Early childhood cuts and withdrawn proposals totaling \$1B for early childhood programs; Black Infant Health Program
- Medi-Cal Proposition 56 funds repurposed away from children's priorities
- Trauma provider training and screenings "decreased but not eliminated"



### Legislation

Legislative items related to children's wellbeing & trauma:

- Childhood lead poisoning prevention bill package
- Student absences for behavioral health reasons
- Office of suicide prevention
- Support for telehealth mental health services for children & pregnant women
- Student Trauma, Grief, and Loss Pilot Program



#### Federal funds

<u>Families First Coronavirus Response Act</u> (signed March 18) – \$104B total; temporary 6.2 percentage point increase in the federal Medicaid matching rate; paid family leave; additional food assistance for families.

Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act (signed March 27) – \$2.2T total; \$150B in state, local, & tribal fiscal relief; \$13.5B for K-12 virtual offerings; \$425M for the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to support student mental health initiatives.



#### Federal funds

Health and Economic Recovery Omnibus Emergency Solutions
(HEROES) Act (passed by House May 15) - \$3T total cost; includes
\$1T in state, local, & tribal fiscal relief; \$100B in education funding for
states & districts; increased SNAP benefits; 14 percentage point
increase in federal Medical matching rate; housing assistance.


