A Comprehensive Child Abuse & Neglect Framework

Georgia Essentials for Childhood is part of a comprehensive effort for child abuse and neglect prevention across several states using the *Essentials for Childhood* framework developed by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)¹.

We are working to **build resilient communities**, address and **prevent adverse childhood experiences**, **improve community environments**, and **reduce and destigmatize trauma**.

Georgia Essentials views this work through an intentional equity and racial justice lens. A child's race, ethnicity, gender, family income, or neighborhood should not predict their future success and well-being.

Using a common agenda and data-driven information, this effort is driven by 5 working groups:

Georgia Essentials is led by the Division of Family and Children Services, the Department of Public Health, and Prevent Child Abuse Georgia, and receives technical assistance from the CDC. This work is guided by a steering committee and includes public and private partners from across the state.

A Call for Prevention

Child abuse and neglect is not caused by a single factor but by multiple factors related to the individual, family, community, and society at large. Environments that have high rates of violence, inequitable access to community resources, and are disproportionately affected by poverty or unemployment are contributors to child abuse and neglect.

On average, DFCS receives over **340 reports**

of child abuse and neglect each day².

Georgia ranked 38th in the nation for child well-being in 2020³.



Economic Well-Being

Rank: 35th

- •20% of children live in homes experiencing poverty
- •27% of children's parents lack secure employment



Education

Rank: 37th

- •50% of children ages 3-4 are not in school
- •65% of 4th graders are not proficient in reading
- •19% of high school students don't graduate on time



Family & Community

Rank: 39th

- •38% of children live in single-parent families
- •74% White vs. 46% Black & Latino families own homes



Health

Rank: 46th

- •10% of babies born have low birth weights
- •7% of children do not have health insurance
- •50% of pregnancy-related deaths are Black women⁴

This framework is designed to outline critical goals for promoting safe, stable, and nurturing relationships and environments and preventing abuse and other forms of adversity. Working together, Georgians can create an environment in which children live their lives to the fullest potential.

Strengthen economic supports	
to families	

- Strengthening household financial security
- Family-friendly work policies

Change **social norms** to support parents and positive parenting

- Public engagement and education campaigns
- Legislative approaches to reduce corporal punishment

Provide quality care and education early in life

- Preschool enrichment with family engagement
- Licensing and accreditation or quality rating and improvement systems

Enhance **parenting skills** to promote child development

- Early childhood home visitation
 - Parenting skill and family relationship approaches

Intervene to lessen harms and prevent future risk

- Behavioral parent training programs
- Treatment to lessen harms of abuse and neglect exposure
- Treatment to prevent negative behavior and later involvement in violence
