2-Day Training:

This two-day institute is to provide mental health clinicians with the knowledge about TF-CBT underlying principles and core components needed to provide this treatment model to traumatized youth and caregivers in everyday clinical settings. Desired outcomes are that participants will obtain knowledge about TF-CBT core principles and components, as well as the research base for TF-CBT needed to implement this model with traumatized youth.


