VII. Community Mini-Grant Awardees

Adrienne Markworth, Leah's Pantry

Leah's Pantry used their mini-grant to launch their Trauma-Informed Nutrition Security Learning Collaborative. This model was quite successful and has been adopted at state level and as well as in Indiana. Eight organizations joined to increase their awareness of trauma-informed care as they worked on identified projects. They received training and technical assistance from Leah's pantry through six virtual sessions over three months, with a focus on building relationships and sharing their work process. 100% of the participants rated this as an excellent program. Jeannie Oestreicher, San Diego Center for Children FFAST Program

FFAST provides outpatient services to foster youth living in FFA homes, offering therapy, support partner and psychiatry services through this BHS-contracted program. BIPOC youth are overrepresented in the foster care system and are often placed in families that are not good cultural matches – which complicates the situation for the youth even more. Resource parents are mostly white and often don't even know there's a miss-match. FFAST used the Mini grant to help with this.

They provided Transracial Parent Coaching for FPs provided by their BIPOC staff with hair and skin care expertise. Coaching included demonstrating skills, going to hair care supply stores which cater to black clients, tutorials on different hair care styles, affirmations while doing hair, and follow up/reflections to support caregiver. They also partnered with the My Brown is Beautiful campaign which was started with Buy Black San Diego to provide products and education to youth in the foster care system. Licensed barbers and braiders provide products and services pro bono. See the attached PowerPoint for additional details and future plans.
