V. SDTIGT Training Committee (5-mins)

Training committee meetings have moved to the 4th Tuesday of every other month from 1p – 2p on Teams. Next meeting is 6/27.

The Committee plans to offer three types of training opportunities:

- 1) Learning Exchanges three times per year
- 2) Annual all day (5 - 6 hours) training – Possibly TIC 101 in the morning and afternoon focused on advanced skill building. Potential topics for fall training: how can law enforcement implement trauma-informed care, focus on young boys and young men - helping them ask for support. Next meeting will refine topic focus.
- 3) Partner with San Diego Domestic Violence Council for their monthly hybrid trainings. We are also able to bring them potential training topics.

Suggestion was made to ensure we do evaluations after trainings.

VII. National Conflict Resolution Center (30-mins)

Juvenile Diversion Initiative (JDI) and the Restorative Collaborative

Iddo Gello and Alexis McAfee from NCRC presented on their Juvenile Diversion Initiative in partnership with the San Diego County DAs office. The JDI is voluntary and an alternative to filing formal charges and is built on 7 main principles with 4 objectives (1. prevent involvement in the juvenile justice system through identifying needs, 2. integrate with community resources, 3. ensure youth are thriving, 4. reduce recidivism).

NCRC identifies community resources and services and supports service partners through trainings and technical assistance. Services include: assessment/case plan for youth, individual and family treatment, 1-1 mentoring, skill building (out of the box - rock climbing, ceramics, etc), CBT, SUD treatment and educational support.

Focus is on expanding and building community and integrating the principles of restorative practices such as victim engagement and participation in restorative conferences and mediation. Victims then qualify to request restitution to support needs. 5 Types of Persons Harmed: Individual, Large Business, Small Business, Family/Friends, and Schools. Small businesses are more willing to participate due to impact of damages vs. larger corporations where the impact isn't as great. Need for more voluntary victim engagement.

Need community engagement including services in areas where the youth live, and which reflects diversity of the youth and person harmed (diverse by ethnicity, gender, etc.). Follow this link to join the team as a Community Provider: www.tinyurl.com/jdisub
