- Educates people in San Bernardino region about adverse chilchood experiences (ACEs) and the effects of toxic stress across different sectors including health, mental health, faith-based communities, juvenile justice, businesses, reentry and schools.
- Actively supports the implementation of trauma-informed practices that increase resilience and wellness for all residents across the life span through authentic community engagement
- Recognizes the mental and emotional impact on those who provide services to communities that experience high ACE scores. Seeks to create a supportive environment that promotes self-care and resilience building for our members, communities, organizations and systems.

EARLY RESULTS: The ACEs Task Force of San Bernardino formed a steering committee which developed a strategic plan to increase awareness about ACEs and the use of realizercy-building skills through community engagement, education, collaboration, and community-based participatory research. Dr. Arlane Marie-Mitchell developed a Whole Child Assessment tool to assist pediatric providers in screening for ACEs, and this same tool has been approved by the State of CA for use with Medi-Cal patients. Part of the work of the Task Force has been to support screening for ACEs by developing and creating awareness about traums-informed, resiliency-building resources in the area.

MEMBERS: We are a grassroots collaboration of community members representing early childhood, family services, education, higher education, foster care, health care, mental health, juverile justice government, business, reentry, and youth-serving organizations. We strive to create a more resilient. San Bernardino region by educating individuals, communities and organizations about ACEs, trauma and resilience; and, by providing training and resources for making policy and practice changes that are needed for create healing in our communities, organizations and systems.

ACEs FACTS FOR SAN BERNARDINO ADULTS: 43.1% of adults in Sen Bernardino County experienced one to three ACEs in their childhood.*

Supported Health, Hurmsn Services Agency with their universal awareness that individuals and organizations impact from trauma and toxic stress.

YOUTH VOICE

- Develops a train-the-trainer model, wherein Youth Voice leaders train peers locally, regionally, nationally and globally.
- Serve as experts on trauma in their community, have suggestions for solutions, and have made a great impact as leaders and advocates for trauma-informed systems across sectors (e.g. education, foster care, probation).
- Forms collaborative partnerships with community agencies that serve as a model for innovative solutions to support resilience and leadership.

EARLY RESULTS: Youth Voice has presented in the last year before the San Diego Police Department; Commission on Gaing Prevention & Intervention; San Diego Worldrore Partnership; County Probation Department; Public Defender; Early Childhood Mental Health Conference; international visitors from the European Union, Middle East and North Africa; and California Department of Public Health.

PARTNERS: Juvenile Services Team of the Mid-City Police Division, Health & Human Services Agency, National Conflict Risolation Center, Alliant International University, San Diego State University, and Point Lona Nazarene University.

FACTS: City Heights is the most diverse community in San Diego. RESTORATIVE COMMUNITY CONFERENCES

- A Restorative Community Conference (RCC) is a meeting between the person that has been harmed, the youth that caused the harm, and the interested people within the community.
- RESOLUTION The goal of the meeting is to create a plan to repair the harm caused by the youth responsible.
 - Everyone in the meeting participates in creating an Action Plan which the youth completes with the support of the community members.

EARLY RESULTS: An analysis of 46 cases that have been closed for at least 6 months showed positive results within the RCC Program. There have been 6 new arrests within the cohort of cases that had an RCC, a 13% recidivism rate, compared to a 33% recidivism rate under the traditional system.

PARTNERS: San Diego Probation Department, San Diego Public Defender, San Diego District Attorney, Mid-City CAN, San Diego Youth Services, San Diego Police Department, San Diego Unified School District, San Diego Unified School District Police Department.

ELIGIBILITY: The responsible youth must be under 17.5 years old, there must be an identifiable victim, and the address of the responsible youth, victim, and/or crime must be in the following:

- City Heights (92102, 92104, 92105, 92115).
- Southeast San Diego (92102, 92113, 92114, 92139)
- Barrio Logan (92113)
- Lemon Grove (91945)
- Spring Valley (91977, 91978).

FACTS: City Heights is a community in San Diego with an overall crime rate that is 28% higher than the national average, while the overall crime rate in San Diego County is 13% lower than the national average (FBI Crime Reports). It's also where three out of four parents are worried about gangs in their neighborhood and at school, and where nearly half of residents say they feel unsafe in their community.

"When you get a chance to say I did this, this is what I am going to do to fix it. It's a lot better than let's lock you up and you're a criminal and you're in here with all these criminals, everybody here is a criminal. It makes him a better person to accept responsibility for himself. Whereas in the criminal justice system, you did it, here's your punishment, you did your punishment and you're out there but you're still the same person, the same person who is going to do it over and over again if something doesn't change, and this program was that change for him." - Person of an RCC Youth
