Workshop A: Impact of Climate Change: Local Disaster Response and Preparedness Mary Szecsey, CEO, West County Health Centers; Gabriela Bernal, COO, Santa Rosa Community Health - Climate change is contributing to the frequency and intensity of local disasters such as the 2017 Complex Fires and the 2019 Russian River Floods. Linda Escalante is the Southern California Legislative Director of the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC). She promotes strong relationships with state and local elected officials, partner organizations, coalitions, and other stakeholders. These collaborations advance the protection of public health and the environment in areas such as zero waste, water supply and quality, clean energy, climate change, oceans, toxic chemicals, endangered species, among many others.

Escalante is a renowned environmental expert in the U.S-based Spanish language—empowering and mobilizing Latinos to engage in advocacy and activism around environmental and health issues. She has been bestowed the Latina Magazine New

Generation Award and named among PODER Magazine's 100 U.S. Green Latino Leaders. Escalante, who is also passionate about civil, immigrant, and women's rights, has served as a board member of a worker wellness and healthcare access organization. She holds a bachelor's in biology from the University of California, Los Angeles and prior to joining NRDC in 2005, Escalante worked for the UCLA/RAND Program on Latino Children with Asthma and Allies Against Asthma in Puerto Rico. Escalante was appointed to the California Coastal Commission by the speaker of the Assembly in May 2019. Prior to that, she served for over a year as an alternate appointee of the state Senate. She is also an ex officio member of the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy Board on behalf of the Commission. She is based in NRDC's Santa Monica office.

Prior to Sarah's work in Sonoma County, she worked in the California Office of Binational Border Health, conducting surveillance for emerging pathogens, and improving cross-border epidemiological communication. She has also conducted public health research with the Berkeley Survey Research Center and UC San Diego Division of Global Public Health. Sarah has significant experience in public health preparedness and response from her time at the UC Davis Medical Center during the 2009 H1N1 influenza pandemic, in the California/Baja California border region, and most recently during the October 2017 Northern California firestorms.

In 2019, Sarah started Data Strategy Consulting. Data Strategy Consulting provides services to the healthcare, education, public health, and philanthropic sectors, and community-based organizations to improve data processes and systems, and translate data into useful information for decision making and racial equity initiatives. In June 2019, Sarah completed a national fellowship with Human Impact Partners called Health Equity Awakened. This fellowship has been pivotal in helping Sarah understand how to advance racial equity with her clients and in her community.

Sarah has a Master in Public Health degree in Epidemiology from San Diego State University and two Bachelor's degrees – Interdisciplinary Studies in Health and Place, and Geography -- from UC Berkeley.



Christina V. Lozada, M.D.

Christina is a 2nd year Resident. Christina is a native of Brooklyn, New York with cultural roots in Ecuador and Puerto Rico. She graduated from Duke University with a degree in Biological Anthropology and Anatomy, Women's Studies and Spanish. She completed a Premedical Graduate Health Science Certificate Program at VCU SOM before entering medical school. As a first-generation Latina, her personal and professional experiences with the many racial, social and economic inequalities that transgress our society influenced her decision to become a physician. She hopes to use her unique position as a Latina physician to impact not only a patient's overall health, but also the larger public health issues that predominate in Latino populations. Her interests include women's health, obstetrics, mental health, global health and mentoring Latino youth in the community. During her free time, she enjoys finding new places to eat, salsa dancing, working out, reading, spending time with her twin sister and being a "titi" to her sister's shih tzu, Chispita.

Christy Lubrin

Christy is the Executive Director and is a co-founder of the Graton Day Labor Center. She is an outspoken proponent for the rights and dignity of immigrant workers and their families. In October of 2017 she helped launch the UndocuFund for Fire Relief.

John Mihalik, M.D.

Dr. John Mihalik has practiced family medicine for more than 30 years. He received his medical degree from University of Washington School of Medicine.

Dr. Mihalik was born in Tachikawa, Japan where his father was stationed in the US Air Force. He is the third of 7 children to a Czechoslovakian father and Mexican mother. As a child within a military family, Dr. Mihalik grew up traveling, going to 10 different schools before graduation from high school. He speaks multiple languages, including Spanish and Medical Creole. He studied astronomy at the University of Arizona before joining the Jesuits and moving to California. As a Jesuit he studied at St. Michael's School of Philosophy and Letters at Gonzaga becoming a Biomedical Ethicist. Dr. Mihalik left the Jesuits in order to study nursing at Seattle University, working as a nurse prior to becoming a physician.

Dr. Mihalik worked as a rural and two-thirds world physician before spending the last 16 years as a hospital medicine specialist and Co-Chair of the Ethics Committee at Kaiser Permanente, Santa Rosa. A talented musician, Dr. Mihalik plays rhythm and lead guitar with Blue 7 Jazz.

John is part of Al Gore's Climate Reality Leadership team and was personally trained by Al Gore and serves as a resource for community groups, government agencies and other Climate Change groups providing Climate Change talks, consultations, legislative analysis and testimony at no cost. His particular emphasis with Climate Reality is work regarding the health effects of Climate Change and the ethical implementation of interventions to assure social justice is promoted.

He is fully bilingual and bicultural which provides a great asset when communicating with the Latino community living in the United States. Hugo has a Bachelor's Degree in Radio and Television from San Francisco State University and has worked in public bilingual radio for more than 18 years. He established his own consulting company (Soluna Outreach Solutions) in 2017 and serves as the CEO, after having worked with C2 Alternative Services for more than fifteen years. He is known in the Bay Area and beyond as an expert in environmental education for Spanish speaking audiences.

Through Soluna Outreach Solutions he provides a variety of services to help clients develop and improve outreach and education programs to Spanish communities, including targeted environmental programs. He has helped developed education and outreach programs for non-English speakers and the community in general. In the process, he helps community and government agencies engage the public around community and environmental issues. Hugo is committed to help clients in the creation of localized programs that improve environmental health and truly engages diverse communities to create behavior change. His company provide text translation services for both public and technical materials; marketing support and community outreach; inmeeting translation services - both concurrent and sequential.


