Lincoln and Project Permanence

Project Permanence is Lincoln's Wraparound Program serving youth referred by Alameda Juvenile Justice and Child and Family Services.

We utilize the wraparound principals to guide our work with families

- Family Voice and Choice
- Team Based
- Community Based
- Collaboration
- Strengths Based
- Individualized
- Natural supports
- Outcomes

Alameda County Child Welfare Outcomes

Seventy-eight percent of youth remained in the home six months after they left Lincoln's Project Permanence program.

SIERRA REGION LEARNING COMMUNITY

Outcome Indicators for Lincoln's Project Permanence Probation Contract

The following outcome indicators are currently included in Lincoln Center's contract with Alameda County Probation Department as measured by Probation arrest and placement data:

- 70 percent of youth shall have no new sustained arrests during the time of treatment to be reviewed at discharge and six months post-discharge.
- 70 percent of youth will be living at home or a home-like setting in the community and not in congregate care at any time within six months of discharge.

Project Permanence-Wraparound Services provided by Lincoln Center for Alameda County Probation Youth

Recidivism* n = 235

- Out of 235 youth who received wraparound services between July 2012 and April 2013, 200 (85%) have had 110 new sustained offenses within six months of their release date from the program.
- The majority of youth (52%) were sent to a placement as a result of their new sustained offense, while 44% were confined on formal supervision.

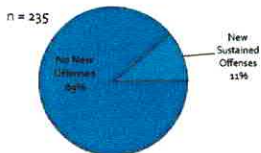
New Sustained Offense Types n = 25

- Auto Theft = 12%
- Robbery = 12%
- Grand Theft = 12%
- Burglary = 12%
- Carry Concealed Weapon = 12%
- Receive Stolen Prop = 12%
- Threaten Crime = 4%
- Felony Assault = 4%
- Obstruction Justice = 4%
- Other = 12%

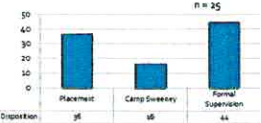
*Recidivism is defined as a new sustained offense and occurs within six months of completing the program.

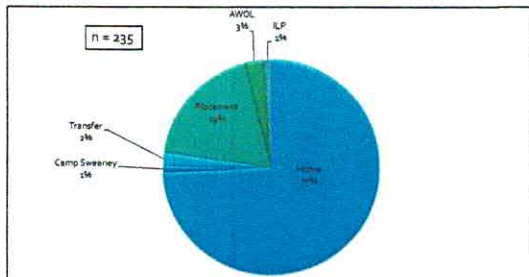
Recidivism*
