

What is involved?

Each trainee develops an individualized training plan that includes coursework, research, and interdisciplinary clinical and community training based on training needs and intensity.

Who oversees LEND training?

LEND faculty members are university-based clinicians, educators, and researchers who provide training and supervision to LEND trainees in their work in community sites. LEND faculty members work with trainees and community staff members to ensure that both trainees and sites benefit from collaborating in the LEND training program.



Who can participate?

- Graduate and post-graduate professionals involved in the care, advocacy, training, and/or teaching of children diagnosed or at-risk for ASD/DD
- Family members and self-advocates with ASD/DD
- Members from community care or education settings serving children, youth, and families with ASD/DD

Recruitment for full-time and parttime trainees begins in January. Selected trainees participate in LEND from September - June.

Community & Clinical Training

LEND training provides hands-on
experiences in everyday interdisciplinary
community settings with families and children
with/at-risk for developmental and behavioral
disorders. Trainees and supporting LEND faculty
coordinate with members of community and
clinical sites to decide what types of activities will
be most helpful for each trainee.



There are no costs to participate in LEND. Some trainees may receive stipends.
